What inspires you in your work?

I am inspired by my community, family, shared experiences of different communities, and ancestors. In response to the call for justice, police accountability, and racism, I addressed the pervasive anti-Black sentiment within Asian communities by initiating the We Gotta Talk monthly virtual series within my community, the Montagnards. I curated presentations and led discussions that centered on identity, Asian American history, and the importance of unlearning and solidarity.

What inspired you to join the DCI CAC?

I was inspired by lack of access to healthcare, history of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color, my family and community's history with cancer to join DCI CAC. I became motivated to join as cancer and heart diseases are the leading causes of death for Southeast Asians in CA which has a potential contributing factor by the use of Agent Orange by the US military in the Vietnam War.



2023 MEN'S HEALTH SCREENING

At the 2023 Men's Health Screening, 207 men received services during the two-day event. It is important to note, there was a 14% increase (N=26) in attendance in 2023 when compared to 2022. The last Men's Health Screening before the COVID-19 pandemic occurred in 2019 with the event returning in 2022.

Mary T. Bassett, MD, MPH


